

## Itinerary #1 – Eastern Ohio

Starting near the Pennsylvania state line in East Liverpool, this 55-mile trip will take you along the lower eastern side of Ohio to a final destination in Bridgeport. Begin your trip on State Route 39 at the Point of Beginning where exploration of the Northwest Territory first began. Continue the trip on State Route 7 to see “America’s Crockery City,” fine European architecture and more. Finally, you’ll reach Bridgeport and enjoy the end of your trip experiencing historic culture of all types.

Sites to see & things to do (listed from east to west)

Attraction	Description
Point of Beginning East Liverpool, Ohio	In 1785, George Washington initiated a comprehensive survey of the Northwest Territory with the settlement of the land as the ultimate goal. The site sits on the Pennsylvania and Ohio state lines and is identified with several markers. <a href="http://www.elchamber.com">www.elchamber.com</a>
Museum of Ceramics East Liverpool, Ohio	The Museum of Ceramics houses an extensive collection of the wares produced by "America's Crockery City." The exhibits in the museum depict the growth and development of East Liverpool and its ceramic industry from 1840 to 1930. Thompson House Mansion East Liverpool, Ohio	This unique house of Italianate Style construction was built in 1876. Contact: (330) 386-5964.
Fourth Street Historic Neighborhood Steubenville, Ohio	Located in Steubenville, this area is an excellent example of preservation of history and neighborhood renovation.
Steubenville Murals Steubenville, Ohio	Find Steubenville’s rich history painted in larger-than-life proportions on 25 outdoor murals located on various buildings throughout downtown Steubenville. Contact: (800) 510-4442.
Historic Fort Steuben Steubenville, Ohio	Originally built in 1787, Fort Steuben opened the door to the Northwest Territory as it protected government surveyors while they laid out the first Seven Ranges. First Federal Land Office Steubenville, Ohio	Get a glimpse of life of the first Ohio settlers at the First Federal Land Office built in 1801. Located next to Historic Fort Steuben. Contact: (740) 264-4534.
Historic Mount Pleasant Mount Pleasant, Ohio	Known for its involvement in the Underground Railroad, anti-slavery movement, and Quaker history, this quaint village boasts diverse architectural styles throughout the entire historic district. The Historical Society of Mount Pleasant operates six historical buildings including the Quaker Yearly Meeting House State Memorial.
